Message for the week of July 28: A Minute with Jesus:

The Eucharist is called Holy Communion - When we receive Holy Communion at Mass, we are receiving Jesus Himself, which is our closest union with Him on earth. As we receive Jesus' Body and Blood into our own body and soul, we are united with Him in a deep and intimate bond. Jesus feeds our soul, strengthening us to be faithful by following Him and loving and serving Him through serving others, particularly those in need. Let's pray this right now and every day this week: Jesus, thank you for the incredible treasure of Holy Communion in which You allow us to be united with You in the closest possible bond of friendship and love. This week, read how Jesus encourages us to "remain" in Him in John 15:4-5.

60,000 Catholics Gather for Eucharistic Congress: A National Eucharistic Congress is an especially powerful manifestation of the unity of the Church. This was evident as a massive throng of 60,000 Catholics gathered to worship Jesus in the Eucharist through the celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, adoration and engaging sessions with dynamic speakers. The Congress took place in Indianapolis July 17-21, at a very important time for our country, as prayer and worship of Jesus reaffirmed the source and summit of our faith, putting Jesus where He belongs—at the center. 75 people from the Diocese of La Crosse attended this historic and transformative Congress.

50th Anniversary Celebrations: Each year there are three dates that are options for couples celebrating their 50th Wedding Anniversary to come together to have Mass with the Bishop, followed by a dinner celebration. 16th Dedication Anniversary: You are invited to come and celebrate the Anniversary of the Shrine's Dedication on July 31, 2024 @ 9:00 am - 5:00 pm. This is a day to thank God for all who have shared in Cardinal Burke's vision for this place of pilgrimage under Our Lady's mantle since 2008. At its dedication in 2008, the church became a true sacred space, set apart for divine service, for prayer and especially for the Sacred Liturgy. His Eminence Raymond Leo Cardinal Burke will be the celebrant for the 12:15 pm Holy Mass.

Pontifical Mass with Cardinal Burke: Please join us as His Eminence Raymond Leo Cardinal Burke offers the Solemn Pontifical Mass in the Usus Antiquior. The Pontifical Mass with Cardinal Burke takes place at the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe in La Crosse, WI. August 5th is the patronal feast day of the Basilica of Saint Mary Major in Rome. In 2011 Pope Benedict the XVI affiliated the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe with the Papal Basilica of Santa Maria Maggiore (Saint Mary Major) in Rome. On August 5, pilgrims have the occasion to gain a Plenary Indulgence. 10:30 AM Confessions available 11:00 AM Solemn Pontifical High Mass. Jesus Multiplies our Gifts





From the Pastor's Pen

Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

"There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish;"

Through most of Lectionary Cycle B, our Sunday Gospel readings are taken from the Gospel of Mark. Our Lectionary, however, leaves Mark's Gospel John for the next several weeks. This week's scripture from St John chapter 6 begins a series of Eucharistic discourses. This chapter is sometimes called the "Bread of Life Discourse." John uses this story in his gospel to introduce Jesus' profound and extended reflection on the Eucharist and the Bread of Life.

The Eucharistic coloring of the multiplication of bread is clear in Jesus' blessing, breaking, and giving the loaves. Thus, the miracle itself becomes a symbol of the Eucharist, the sacrament of unity. In this miracle, Jesus transforms a young boy's offering of five barley loaves and two fish. In the offertory at Mass, we present the fruits of our labors, represented by bread and wine. These gifts, given to us first by God as grain and fruit, are returned to God in our offering of thanksgiving. God in turn transforms our gifts, making this bread and wine the very Body and Blood of Jesus. We also offer ourselves in this exchange, and we, too, are transformed by the Eucharist. This daily breaking of the bread also had eschatological associations. It was an anticipation of the messianic banquet. John's description of this event anticipates the Messianic banquet of heaven, as the crowd sits down in rows to enjoy a great free meal. Each time we celebrate the Eucharist, we are anticipating the eternal banquet of heaven.

National Eucharistic Congress which concluded last Sunday was the new Pentecost for the Church in the United States. The pilgrims have returned home, the stage in Lucas Oil Stadium has been dismantled, and the Blessed Sacrament has been reposed in the tabernacle. But I hope the revival that has been renewing the Eucharistic belief and devotion of Catholics across the country will not be a one-and-done moment. Rather it would revitalize our Eucharistic faith and live it out each and every day: to participate in Mass more fully and faithfully, to prioritize spending time with the Lord in Eucharistic adoration, and to confess Christ's Real Presence in the Eucharist with more clarity and conviction.
