## **Message for the week of February 16:**

A Minute with Jesus: Jesus will help us believe what we cannot understand. The Lord always comes in to strengthen and confirm our faith in response to our desire to believe. He actually even uses our hesitation in accepting His Real Presence in the Eucharist to bring us to a deeper, more lively faith in the truth of this mystery. Let's pray this right now and every day this week: Jesus, please strengthen my faith to believe that You are truly present in the holy Eucharist. This week, read how Jesus responds to those who are questioning the mystery of the Eucharist in John 6: 52-59.

Jubilee 2025—Pray as 'Pilgrims of Hope': We live in a time of much anxiety, fear, unsettledness and discontent. The theme for this Jubilee Year 2025 should capture our attention, with its focus on hope. Hope is an incredible virtue which is given to us by God at baptism that disposes us to live in relationship with the Blessed Trinity. Hope is the virtue "by which we desire the Kingdom of Heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit" (CCC #1817). During this year of hope, "let us lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus" (Heb. 12:1-2). One way to participate in Jubilee 2025 is to receive the sacraments on a more frequent basis. The sacrament of the holy Eucharist - Jesus Himself - opens our eyes to see His power and love in action in our daily lives and those around us. Let us join the parish family in gathering together each Sunday (or Saturday evening) to be strengthened in the powerful gift of hope.

Men of the Cross "Freedom in Forgiveness": Our relationship with Christ is many things. He is your refuge, someone to celebrate your joys, mourn with you in your sorrows and is the one to break the chains that bind you and set you free. What are the chains that bind you? The world tries to convince you that the baggage you carry is not too heavy and that you probably deserve to carry that burden. But that is a lie. Christ wants you to be set free. There is Freedom in Forgiveness! Maybe you have been carrying around the same burden for a long time. Maybe you really don't understand forgiveness, how to forgive others, or how to forgive yourself. You may have forgotten what it feels like to be free. Join men from all over the Diocese of La Crosse and beyond, to experience Freedom in Forgiveness through Mass, inspiring talks, honest discussion and fellowship. The Church needs men to live free, allowing them to help other men break the chains that bind them so they may also live the joy-filled life that Christ wants for us.

more important to you than money and things. If you are hungry then you appreciate food more. If you are sad then sometimes it's easier to remember to pray.



# From the Pastor's Pen

# **Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time**

Our Gospel reading for today comes right after Jesus has picked the twelve. Then, having chosen these apostles He leads them down the mountain and begins to speak to the people waiting there. There are also a lot of curious people who have come a long way to hear Jesus and to be healed. Jesus starts by healing those who need it, and then he turns to the disciples again, not just the twelve, but the larger crowd and begins to speak to them about the Beatitudes.

Standing in front of Jesus in the crowd are the poor, the hungry, those who mourn, and those who are persecuted. There are also those standing in the crowd who have selfishly hoarded their riches. Jesus standing in a great prophetic tradition of ancient Israel, which sees the coming 'Day of the Lord' as a great reversal tells them about what it means to be blessed. We are blessed when we are God-centered, regardless of our earthly circumstances, and we find woe whenever we are self-centered.

When Jesus blesses the poor and hungry, the sorrowful and the ridiculed, he isn't saying that we should all aspire to poverty, hunger, sorrow, or being verbally abused. It would rather mean God is present with us, even when the world has abandoned us; that God loves us, even when everyone else hates us.

When Jesus announces woe to those who are rich, who eat well, and enjoy fame and admiration from people, he isn't saying that wealth, good food, and popularity are bad things. It could mean that when we are focused on satisfying our own appetites, we have turned our attention away from God, and our self-centeredness will be our spiritual doom. Where am I in my spiritual journey? Am I self-centered or God centered?
